

All counseling, clinical psychology, social work, spiritual direction, pastoral counseling, life coaching and mentoring training programs include considerable attention to the development of core relationship dynamics that foster connection, understanding and progress toward goals."

This groundbreaking textbook will fill a gap in the educational resources for counseling and communication, using a microskills approach to teach foundational helping proficiencies for those in Christian and spiritually-attuned helping relationships. It will focus on teaching specific techniques and providing practical exercises to establish a solid foundation of helping skills. Using Scripture, theological reflection and spiritual formation concepts, this text will illustrate the important principles of empathy, authenticity and confrontation.

"We expect that many who read this book will identify themselves as counselors (or on their way to becoming counselors of some variety), while others of you are in related helping roles that are not specifically identified as counseling roles," write the authors. "Regardless of your calling, whether you are a pastor, spiritual director, life coach, mentor, pastoral care provider, mental health counselor in training or in some other people-helping role, we assume that you care about the psychological-emotional-spiritual well-being of people or you would not be reading this book."
