

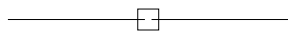
Engage with Theologians from the Majority World

Yet most theological literature does not reflect the rising tide of Christian reflection coming from these regions. - explorations of how Scripture, tradition, and culture fit together to guide the church's theological reflection
- scholars demonstrating how to read the Bible and think theologically in light of contextual resources and concerns
- inside views on what doing theology looks like in contributors' cultures and what developments they hope for in the future

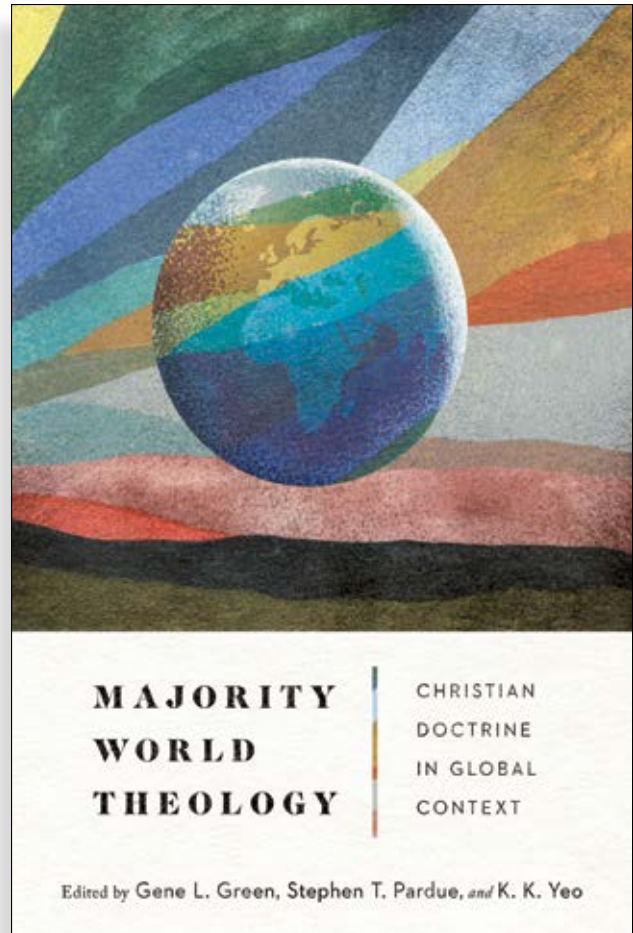
Majority World Theology is an essential resource for students, theologians, and pastors who want to expand their theological horizons.
