Who Moved My Neighborhood?

Neighborhoods are moving. While offering opportunities for some, gentrification can be a vastly different experience for longtime residents and neighborhood churches. As a pastor who led his church through its own moved neighborhood in Portland, Mark Strong gives insight to churches that need to heal from the wounds of gentrification and revamp their mission amid an uncertain future.

Redemptive Reengagement

Throughout our nation many neighborhoods are moving. These shifts can result from economic growth or decline, gentrification, or other geographical changes. These changes bring with them a mixed bag of emotions, perspectives, and opportunities. For some, the changing neighborhood becomes the new "promised land," the turf of fresh opportunity—an old space made new, filled with chic, artsy, and trendy hotspots. They become the electric place with the "buzz," where people come from across the state and the nation to "vibe." They are the compelling new oases where a whole new demographic wants to live and be.

But for the longtime residents of those neighborhoods, the sentiments are vastly different. With the rapid emergence of new developments, businesses, and residences, they lament as they watch the fingerprints left by past generations on their beloved community vanish as neighborhood revitalization progresses. As their semblance disappears, they feel unwanted, powerless, and insignificant in a neighborhood which for years has been their home.

The church is not exempt from these difficult neighborhood shifts. When a local church has loved and served its community for years and, suddenly, becomes strangers in its own neighborhood, the challenges are great. Its new reality forces it to change internally and externally. How the church navigates these changes determines if it will live, die, or be reduced to a tragic existence on life support.

Navigating a new neighborhood is complex. It requires the church to deliberately take the time to process the new changes, to grieve, and to heal. It also requires a revamping, where the church must courageously look at itself in the mirror and ask difficult, heart-probing questions that will cause some discomfort—transformational questions that will require hard work to answer. Enmeshed in the process as well is the task of discerning God's will, a reconciling of sorts that suggests that in the unwanted (or maybe wanted) changes our neighborhoods have undergone, God may be up to something new. This process also involves coming to grips with the truth that the newness may require our churches to change in order to reengage our neighborhoods in a redemptive manner—or perhaps choose another option.

My purpose in writing this book is to compassionately help pastors, leaders, and churches faithfully navigate the treacherous terrain of a changing neighborhood—a moved neighborhood. This is not a book about gentrification per se, but it will show you how our church has navigated some of the difficulties inevitably brought on by gentrification in our city in order to share what we've learned so far in our process. And, for the record, by no means have we arrived! I'm not writing as an expert or a guru who has it figured all out but as a fellow sojourner serving Christ and his church in a moved neighborhood.

Regardless of what's transpiring in the changing community around you, God still has a great purpose for your church. With his divine assistance you can help navigate your church into an exciting future in an old but new neighborhood.
